


Neighbourhood Noise Policies and Practice for Local Authorities – a Management Guide

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The Guide was prepared under a number of contracts let and sponsored by Defra in association with the CIEH but it is largely based on the work of Temple Environmental Consultants, published as a draft for consultation in June 2003. The results of that consultation and the further contributions of the CIEH and Defra have been incorporated into this final document.

The appendices provide examples of some practices and procedures sourced from a variety of local authorities. They should be read in conjunction with the main Guide. Though most have been amended to some degree for the purposes of this document, they nevertheless necessarily reflect the interpretation of legislation and guidance, the legal advice, the structure, organisation and operational practices, and the needs and circumstances of the particular local authority which devised them. They cannot be exhaustive and the intention is not to recommend them as 'best practice' for unquestioned adoption by every local authority; rather they are provided as a starting point for developing practices and procedures for tackling noise issues in response to individual local authorities' own needs and circumstances, while nevertheless promoting some consistency among them all.

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
